Death Takes Indian Woman 107 Years Old

Mrs. Flora Clark died Saturday at the Butte County Hospital. She was 107 years old.

Graveside services will be held at the Indian Village Cemetery tomorrow at 10:30 a.m.

Mrs. Clark, born in Covelo, Calif., April 30, 1849, would have celebrated her 108th birthday in April. Although she had been blind for several years, her mind was alert and her memories of early days were clear.

Nearly her entire life was lived in Round Valley. She moved to Chico seven years ago to be with her nephew, Sherman Wilson. A niece, Mrs. Eva Pierce of Oakland also survives.

Funeral arrangements were made by Bruce Funeral Home.

Flora Clark is Gone

Another of our oldtimers has crossed over Jordan. From the Sacramento Bee we learn that Flora Clark, who lived nearly all of her long life in Round valley, passed away in Chico hospital January 5, and was buried there. Flora was

said to be 107 years old at the time of her death. Could be, for as a child of six she came in with the big drive of Indians from Concow valley. She married Walter Clark and theirs was a happy life together, till his death about 20 years ago. If Walter was out in vaquero camp, Flora went along and helped with the cooking. If there was a bear hunt and Walter took his hounds, he took Flora along, and she would watch and listen, standing on a high point, her long dress fluttering, saying, Them poor dogs. Won't somebody go to them? Flora rode over many

steep trails on a sidesaddle and was always friendly and full of fun. For some time Flora had been blind and when she could no longer care for herself her nephew, Sherman Wilson, took her to Chico to care for. While she was still living here the neighbors felt responsibility, and took turns getting her errands done. Ace Hoaglen was one who kept her in wood, and the stores carried food to her.

In her neat sitting room, the last time I could visit her, she had a handsome black walnut bureau; it had a marble top and carved handles for the drawer pulls. When I admired it she said proudly, "Frankie White gave me that" One by one, our Old People are passing on. They represent a period in the life of Round valley, which we shall not see again. We could wish that Flora's body could have been brought home to lie beside the husband in the land where she was such a valued citizen, but we know that she is with Walter now.

It is a privilege to have known her.
