It has been pointed out that we had 2 errors in our recipe of last week, Crunchy Bulgur Muffins.

It should read 1 1/3 cups of water, and 1/4 cup melted butter or margarine.

For this weeks recipe credit goes to Clarice McCulloch of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Her recipe for home made "Cold Duck Wine".

1 large can frozen grape juice  
(24 oz. size)

1/2 cups sugar

1 square yeast cake dissolved in a little warm water.

Put all ingredients in gallon jug, fill up with water, tie on 10¢ balloon, let stand for 30 days, balloon will inflate. Taste at this time, may take a little longer than 30 days. Wait until balloon deflates, if desired keep 1/2 months and it really "gets good". WARNING: Don't keep top tight after balloon comes off.
