RECIPE OF THE WEEK

BAKED BEANS

2 - 1 lb. can baked beans in tomato sauce
1 tbsp. minced onion
1 tsp. prepared mustard
1 tsp. horseradish
1 tsp. chili powder
8 slices bacon
4 slices pineapple, cut into halves
1/2 cup brown sugar
whole cloves
butter

Combine beans, onion, prepared mustard, horseradish and chili powder. Pour mixture into a greased 10 x 6 x 2 inch baking dish. Spread a small amount of prepared mustard on

each slice of bacon. Arrange over beans. Place pineapple halves over meat in any design desired. Sprinkle brown sugar over pineapple, stud with whole cloves and dot with butter. Bake at 325° for 1 hour or more. Makes 8 servings.
