Annulment Ends Half of
Double Reno Marriage
Of Year Ago

Miss Sylvia Mauerhan, 18, East-bay society girl, whose elopment and marriage to Albert Henisch, 21, of a prominent West Virginia family,

"disappointed" Thomas Thunen, young son of an Oakland attorney a year ago, is now Mrs. Thomas Thunen.

Their recent marriage at Los Angeles was revealed last night by friends and confirmed by Mrs. John E. Mauerhan, 619 Santa Rey avenue.

When the former Miss Mauerhan eloped to Reno with Henisch, whom she had known less than a week, Thunen was speeding across the country by plane for a meeting at Oakland airport with Miss Mauerhan. He was "deeply shocked" by the news of the elopement.

The romance of the girl and Thunen blossomed anew and culminated in their marriage.

Later the four were named defendants in a \$10,000 damage suit as the result of an automobile accident which occurred on their honeymoon in the Pacific northwest.
