## Watt Maxwell Weds New Jersey Girl

● WATT Maxwell, the Quincy soldier of 1917-18 who joined the Navy this time, has been married at New York City.

His bride is the former Miss Marie McFarland of Newark, N. J.

"When I came to New York," Watt writes, "romance was furthest from my mind. But I met a very nice girl here, and when I came back from Africa this time we just got married.

"We were married in New York City, as I had only five days' leave. New York State waives the three-day waiting law for service men."

Watt is aboard a destroyer. The entire ship's crew was entertained at a dinner dance and party at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel March 29, with Schnozzle Durante as master of ceremonies.

"There is a lot more entertainment and glamour for us in this war when we are in New York than there was in 1917," Watt says. "And I don't know but what the duty out there is just about as tough."

The informal ceremony was performed by Rev. George C. Culbertson and the chapel was decorated with baskets of white gladioli, palms and candelabra.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, wore a two-piece dress of gold crepe with long sleeves, and brown and white accessories. She carried a bouquet of five gardenias. Her university roommate, Miss Katherine Klutty of Douglas, was her attendant, and

she wore a dress of aqua crepe with white accessories and a corsage of talisman roses. Joe Heiligeis of Kingman was best man, and ushers were Vaughn Manley, the bride's brother, and Slade Sibley.

The double ring ceremony was followed by a reception at the La Jolla Woman's Club. Out-of-town guests included Mrs. Manley Schuler and Miss Louise Manley of Tucson, Mrs. Paul E. Swain of Oklahoma City, and Mr. and Mrs. Alfred John Mullen of Kingman.

The bride is a graduate of Bishop's School in La Jolla and has completed her junior year at the university. The bridegroom attended the University of Arizona before entering the navy in 1943.

The couple will make their home at the Mullen Ranch at Kingman after July 1, and both plan to attend the university this fall.
