MULLEN-WILSON WEDDING

Bride and Groom Left On
the 4:50 Train For Cal-
ifornia—Will Be at Home
In Tempe After Septem-
ber 1

The past couple of months has broken all matrimonial records in Tempe and vicinity. Not only have there been an unusual number of weddings in Tempe, but there have been several away from here in which Tempe people were concerned. Some of these have been surprises and some have been expected. One that occurred yesterday afternoon may be classed about midway between these two divisions, for it has been known for some time that they were to be married, but the exact date had not been made public.

The wedding of Miss Bertha Wilson to John Oscar Mullen took place yesterday afternoon at the home of the bride's father, George W. Wilson, on Normal street. The wedding was a decidedly quiet one, there being present only a few of the contracting parties. Promptly at 4 o'clock the two, unattended, took their places before Rev. R. L. Creal, who pronounced them man and wife, using a form of the ring ceremony. Almost immediately after the ceremony the newly wedded couple were taken to the train, where they took the 4:50 M. & P. passenger south.

The marriage of these two well known young people yesterday afternoon is the culmination of a romance of many years' standing. Both are graduates from the normal, the bride with the class of 1895 and the groom two years later. They were school mates together and were good friends in those days. This friendship ripened into something stronger and more durable and the ceremony of yesterday afternoon was the natural and logical consequence.

But for the fact that Mr. Mullen occupies the prominent position of postmaster, the chances are that the wedding would have taken place some little time ago. Mr. Mullen is not like the private individual who can leave town whenever he so desires. He has to obtain the consent of Uncle Sam first. In this instance there were several annoying delays before the leave of absence was finally granted. This leave having been obtained, the wedding was planned immediately. During the absence of the postmaster, Miss Lottie Mullen will have charge of the office.

There are probably no two young people better known on the south side of the river than Mr. and Mrs. Mullen. The bride is the eldest daughter of George W. Wilson and for a number of years since her graduation from the Normal has been one of the efficient teachers in the Tempe public school. She has also been prominent in lodge and social circles of Tempe and has a large circle of friends.

Mr. Mullen enjoys a wide acquaintance, not only on this side of the river, but all over the county. He was for a time prominent in educational work, having for several terms been at the head of the public school here. In more recent years he has taken something of a hand in politics and gave up his school work to accept the more important position of postmaster. He has now almost completed his first term in that capacity with general satisfaction.

Mr. and Mrs. Mullen will spend the next month or six weeks in different California resorts and will upon their return make their home at the Mullen house on East Sixth street. They will be at home there to their friends after September 1.

Shortly after the close of school the members of the public school faculty tendered Miss Wilson a shower. It was kept very quiet at the time and only a short time ago a kitchen shower was tendered the two by the Pythian Sisters. Mr. Mullen was unfortunately in Globe at the time and was not present at the shower. He will, however, reap the benefit just as if he had been there.
