EDWIN WILSON, CHICO PIONEER, DIES IN DURHAM

Death Follows Illness of Few Days Duration; Was Former Butte County Supervisor

Foreman of Grand Jury in 1917; Served as School Trustee at Pentz Many Years

Edwin C. Wilson, former supervisor of Butte county for sixteen years, died at his home in Durham at 7:30 last night from an illness of but a few days duration, death being caused by an attack of heart disease and paralysis. The deceased was a native of Phillippi, Barbour county, West Virginia and was 69 years old.

Wilson came to Chico in 1874 and was associated with Ben Allen, manager of the Sierra Lumber company for several years, at the same time attending high school at the Woodman's academy during the winter months.

After remaining in Chico for four years Allen and Wilson moved to Pentz where they continued to work in the lumber industry for several years before Wilson purchased the store and blacksmith shop at that place and entered into business. He served as postmaster, in addition to his duties as store keeper, at Pentz for a period of nine years and only resigned as postmaster when he was elected as a member of the board of supervisors. A short time after his election he sold his store in order that he might devote his entire time to his office, but retained extensive farming interests that he had accumulated by his diligent toiling.

After leaving the board of supervisors Wilson continued his farming and mining activities which were in the Butte Star Mine in the Nimshew district and the Jack Welch mine that is located on his stock range.

Wilson served the county as a supervisor from January 1, 1899 until January 1, 1915, serving four four-year terms from the fifth district. He was also foreman of the county grand jury in 1917.

In fraternal life Wilson was associated with the Table Mountain Lodge No. 124, Free and Accepted Masons, of Cherokee, of which he was past master, and Cherokee Lodge, No. 94, I. O. O. F., of which he had served two terms as noble grand.

He was also an enthusiastic supporter of the schools and served as a trustee of the Pentz district for a number of years.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Mary Wilson, of Durham and two daughters, Miss Eddis Wilson, of Durham, who is attending the Chico State Teachers college, and Mrs. Edna Sherry of San Diego, who was present at the bed side of her father during his last illness.

The funeral will be held at the home in Durham at 1 o'clock Tuesday, under the direction of Hamilton and Riley of Oroville. The services at the home will be under the auspices of the Cherokee Masonic lodge and at Clear Creek cemetery under the auspices of the Cherokee I. O. O. F.

LUCIUS A. SNOW, PIONEER BUTTE COUNTY GOLD MINER, DIES AT HOME AT LOVELOCK

Lucius A. Snow, pioneer Butte county gold miner, merchant and farmer, died at his home at Lovelock, in the mountains east of this city, yesterday morning following an illness of but a few days duration, which was brought about by a severe attack of a grippe. Snow at the time of his death was 95 years, five months and three days old and was a native of Paxton, Worcester county, Massachusetts.

Snow, the fifth child of a family of eight children, all of whom are now deceased, was reared in the cities along the eastern coast, obtaining his education in the Lester and East Hampton academies. At the age of 18 he began serving as a carpenter's apprentice and at the end of three years' time had mastered the trade. With this accomplishment he was allowed to work on a new church being erected in his home city, for which he received the sum of \$21 a month. His salary while learning the occupation was \$8 the first year and \$16 the second.

Filled with the desire to see the west Snow made up his mind to travel to Wisconsin, then a border state. His parents objected strongly to the contemplated migration but despite their objections he departed for the new state in October, 1849. He arrived in Racine, Wisconsin, late that fall and from that point went to Milwaukee.

Snow remained in the vicinity of Milwaukee until 1852, when with a party of two other young men he outfitted for the trip to California, coming by way of the Beckworth route, and arriving at Quincy, Plumas county on August 7, of the same year.

The three young men then began mining in Taylor's Gulch and with the arrival of winter and its deep snow and drifts, were confronted with a rapidly diminishing food supply. After living for more than two weeks without flour and other supplies news was received to the effect that a small supply of food was being sold at a store in Meadow valley and Snow, with one of his companions, crossed the mountains to purchase the needed supplies.

Arriving at the store at Pea Vine, now Merrimac, the pair expended their resources, consisting of only \$150, for flour, beans and potatoes at the rate of fifty cents per pound, and after loading their purchases on an improvised hand sled began the return journey across the mountain to their camp.

Snow settled at Diddwell's Bar, then the county seat of Butte county, in 1854, and remained there for a year before removing to Oroville. There he purchased a large lot at the corner of what is now Robinson and Lincoln streets and erected a home.

During the time he lived at Diddwell's Bar and Oroville Snow continued to follow the occupation of mining. His last strike was made at the Little Kimshew in 1860, when he cleaned up forty pounds of gold during the season.

With his treasure Snow left for Oroville and from there to the mint at San Francisco. The journey, made by horseback and by stage, was made only after he had outwitted three desperadoes who had planned to rob him of his wealth.

With the proceeds from the sale of his gold Snow purchased a store at Kimshew, where he installed a well selected stock of general merchandise and where he continued to do business for many years. To assist in developing the mountain section where he lived Snow, with a small force of men, constructed the road from Kimshew to where Stirling City and Lovelock are now located and also with H. C. and H. K. Snow, built the Snow ditch for irrigating and mining purposes. This ditch was later sold to the Hendricks company of Indiana.

He was married in San Francisco in 1864 to Miss Mary A. Sharp. To this union three children were born, and two of whom now survive. They are Josephine and Martha W. Snow, both of Lovelock. The widow, Mrs. Mary A. Snow, also survives.

The funeral services will be conducted from the ranch home at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon. Rev. Chapman, pastor of the Stirling City Presbyterian church, will officiate. Burial will be made in the cemetery at Coulter. The funeral will be directed by Bicknell and Moore.

Jack Frango, Indian Pioneer, Bidwell's Stock Man, Dies

Jack Frango, who helped build the Bidwell mansion and was present when the treaties with the Indians of this district was signed in the early '50's, died last night at the local Indian village. According to members of the local tribe Frango was between 90 and 100 years of age.

Frango was born and reared in this vicinity and roamed about what is now Chico, then a vast plain. In his early life he was head stockman on the Sam Nell ranch at Durham. Later he came to Chico when General Bidwell arrived and became connected with the Bidwell ranch, of which he was a rider on the range.

In the years 1851 and 1852 Frango witnessed the signing of the eighteen treaties between seven tribes of Indians of the Sacramento valley and the state of California, in which the Indians were to receive a vast tract of land, if they would agree to cease warfare with the white settlers.

He is the last members of the famous Indian Masonic lodge, of which he was the most active member. Frango was looked upon as one of the leading spirits of the local Indian village. Upon the death of the late Mrs. Annie E. K. Bidwell, he was left \$1,000.

CHICO (Butte Co.), June 23.—

James B. Doyle, recognized as an authority on hydraulic mining because of his management of it in the Cherokee district for many years, died late Saturday in his daughter's home in Chico.

He was born in County Down, Ireland, in 1847, and at the age of 24, came direct to the famous Cherokee Mine which he operated until it suspended. He then was appointed superintendent of the La Grange Mine in Trinity County, and remained so for seven years. Later he was superintendent of the North Bloomfield Mine in Nevada County. In each the mines he managed he continued development of the hydraulic system.

For a year he was in Alaska and upon his return to Chico retired from active mining.

Doyle married Mary J. O'Neill in 1874, the daughter of a well known pioneer miner, by whom he had eleven children. Had he lived until September, he and Mrs. Doyle would have celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. The family has lived in Chico since 1900.

Surviving besides the widow are one son, James T. Doyle, Sacramento manager for the Virden Packing Company; and three daughters, Sister Mary Austin of the Holy Family Convent, Oakland; Sarah A., and Mary E. Doyle of Chico.

Louis Glass, Pioneer Telephone Manager, Dies

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13.—Louis Glass, California pioneer for many years identified with the telephone industry on the Pacific Coast and organizer of the telephone service in the Philippines, died yesterday morning at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Frances Glass Beamer.

He was born in Maryland in 1845 and came to California as a boy. Here he went to work for the Western Union Telegraph Company as an operator in 1868 and in 1879 transferred his activities to the telephone lines. In 1892 he became assistant general manager of the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph Company, and in 1893 he was elected general manager of this company and of the Sunset Telephone and Telegraph Company.

He organized the Philippine Telephone and Telegraph Company in 1905 and has been its president ever since, leaving his other connections in 1912 to devote all of his time to the islands.

He was a member of the Pacific Union and Bohemian Clubs, California Lodge No. 1, F. & A. M., Golden Gate Commandery and Islam Shrine. His daughter and two grandchildren are the only survivors of his family.

GLASS ONCE WIDELY KNOWN IN BUTTE

(By Bee Bureau)

OROVILLE (Butte Co.), Nov. 13.—Louis Glass, official of the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph Company, who died in San Francisco yesterday, at one time was widely known in Butte County.

Glass came with his family to Cherokee, then a lively mining camp, in 1866. As a youth he became a telegraph operator and was known as one of the best on the coast. Following up this occupation he moved to Oroville.

With Mining Company.

Later Glass became secretary and eventually superintendent of the Spring Valley Mining Company of Cherokee. As superintendent he succeeded Garney Williams, who later became famous in the diamond fields of South Africa.

This was in 1882. Later John J. Sabin, brother-in-law of Glass, organized a telephone company and in 1888 Glass became associated with the company, later rising to general manager.

The deceased was an uncle of Scott and Winona Hendricks, the latter of Chico; and of the late Will Hendricks, of Sacramento. Another nephew, Samuel Hendricks, resides in San Francisco. Mrs. Frances-Glass Beamer, at whose home he died, married A. D. Beamer, son of the late Richard Beamer of Woodland.
