NO EVIDENCE OF FOUL PLAY IN MINER'S DEATH

Special Investigator James Chubbuck returned from Cherokee last night where he went in search of evidence which might throw a light upon the manner in which William Weiser, miner of that district, sustained a fractured skull, from which he died at the county infirmary Wednesday evening.

On his death bed at the infirmary Weiser told Constable William Fitch that the skull fracture was inflicted by a miner who entered his cabin. It was thought, however, that this story was the result of a delirious condition.

The investigation showed that Weiser had undoubtedly fallen through the window of his cabin and had struck his head on a sharp rock. A watch and \$50 in bills was found on his person.

An inquest will be held under the direction of Deputy Coroner C. O. Hamilton.

Residents of Cherokee say that Weiser had been suffering from a dangerous case of pneumonia and attribute his fate to a weakened condition.

Weiser's body was found by residents of the old mining town.

This was the announcement made yesterday by Sheriff R. N. Anderson following a thorough investigation of the case.

The aged man was suffering from an attack of pneumonia. He fell through a window in his cabin and suffered a fractured skull.

Weiser was taken to the county infirmary where he died.

DEATH CLAIMS J. M. M'GEE,
BRILLIANT ATTORNEY AND
PIONEER BUILDER OF CITY

While enjoying breakfast in San Francisco with his daughter, Mrs. Raymond Colvin, J. M. McGee, 55, prominent Oroville attorney, was stricken with apoplexy of the brain yesterday morning at 8 o'clock and died almost instantly. Death occurred at Mrs. Colvin's apartment.

Mr. McGee had left Oroville two days ago on business and was in excellent health up until the time of his death.

The deceased, one of Oroville's best known citizens, was a native of this city, having lived here since childhood. For several years, when yet a boy, he attended the Cherokee school, but later moved with his parents to this city.

The remains will arrive here today on the Western Pacific after which funeral arrangements will be announced.

Mr. McGee is survived by his wife, Mrs. Tura McGee, of Oroville; a son, John, and mother, Mrs. Mary McGee, both of this city; two daughters, Mrs. Genevieve Gertz of Berkeley, and Mrs. Raymond Colvin of San Francisco; also two sisters, Mrs. George Matthews of Oroville, and Mrs. Delbert Walsh of Chico.

Was Pioneer Builder Here

Mr. McGee was a pioneer in the development of Oroville, he having constructed the Jones building, at the corner of Bird and Meyers Streets. The structure was later sold by Mr. McGee to Major A. F. Jones. He, with his father and brother, were also the owners of the Oroville Flour Mills, at that time one of the largest mills in Northern California. The mill was destroyed by fire.

When the dredging boom swept Oroville, Mr. McGee again became active and it was through his efforts that one of the largest dredging concerns was located here, the land upon which the company operated having been sold to them by the deceased.

He was a man of strong character, one who loved his family and gave to them every advantage.

In politics he was a Democrat and will be remembered by pioneers of the district as chairman of the Butte County Democratic Central Committee in the days prior to the birth of the primary election laws.

Wide Interests

With the death of Mr. McGee there passes one of the most interesting and

active figures in Northern California's business and professional life.

Although a lawyer first, the ramifications of Mr. McGee's interests brought him into active touch with business men and bankers all over Northern California. He was a well known figure in San Francisco business circles, both buying and selling heavily in real estate there. He was also interested in farming, and he had become an intimate student of practically all forms of investment. The soundness of his judgment, his absolute integrity in all of his dealings won for him the respect and the admiration of business men all over the wide area in which he operated.

Loved The Law

While investments and finance occupied much of his attention, Mr. McGee, however, was primarily always an attorney. He loved the law and read law constantly, and studied its every branch. He was an acknowledged authority on those branches of law, dealing with real estate operations. His forms were eagerly sought after by other attorneys.

Powerful Advocate

In court Mr. McGee was a convincing pleader. He could quote at will both secular and religious literature. He was particularly a close student of Shakespeare.

Mr. McGee's intimate knowledge of the law, his power as an advocate, his fairness made him both respected and feared by the opposing counsel when he was retained.

Unusual Personality

Mr. McGee was both impressive in his appearance and unusual in his personality. He was a wide reader, a profound thinker, and paid but little attention to usual opinion or superficial sentiment. He was strongly for those things he favored, and opposed with equal force those things which did not appeal to him as just or right. His opinions he backed up with both fact and logic.

Death Means Great Loss

Oroville will greatly miss Mr. McGee. His death removes from the Butte County bar one of the ablest attorneys of the State. Respected by all, his friendship highly prized by those to whom he accorded the privilege of intimate acquaintanceship, his death marks a very great loss not only to Oroville, but to Butte County and Northern California.

SUSIE MORRISON, LAST OF FAMOUS INDIAN TRIBE, CALLED BY DEATH

Susie Morrison, age 101, as near as pioneers of Cherokee can estimate, and last of a famous tribe of Digger Indians, has left hardship and grief behind her and has gone to the happy hunting ground to mingle with her people.

Susie, who was known to all the pioneer families of Butte County, had lived during California's romantic past. She had seen the great influx of palefaces to California in the fifties, had witnessed the wars between the Indians and the invading whites, and finally, saw her own tribe murdered by a blood-thirsty band of Cherokees, who swept down upon the Digger settlement over seventy years ago. Only she and a small boy, who later

became her husband, were left to tell of the gruesome tragedy. One hundred and fifty braves were shot down by arrows while the squaws were slashed to death with knives.

Susie had grown to love her pale-face friends and often told of her early life and of how children of her unfortunate tribe were killed by the invaders who crammed rocks down their captives throats.

Susie's funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at the Cherokee cemetery. They were largely attended and many beautiful floral pieces bespoke the love and affection in which the aged Mahala was held.

The deceased is survived by a son, Dave Morrison, of Scotch Flat.

He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Bowles, esteemed pioneer Petalumans who lived many years near this city, Mr. Bowles and sons conducting a large flouring mill on the present site of the Argus office. The mill went out of existence years ago and later Mr. Bowles was associated in the hardware business with his late brother-in-law, John Scott. Some years ago Mr. Bowles sold his beautiful home on Post street, this city, and with his family moved to San Francisco, this step being taken because their only daughter married and went to San Francisco to live and they desired to be near her.

Mr. Bowles was aged 68 years and was the youngest member of the Bowles family. DAN JAMES IS CRUSHED TO DEATH UNDER TRUCK WHEELS

Dan James, well known resident of Oregon City, met an untimely death yesterday when his head was crushed beneath the wheel of a Ford Truck. Bleeding and badly lacerated, James was brought to a local hospital where attempts of physicians failed to save his life. He died at 5:35 o'clock.

James, accompanied by his two nephews, was returning from a quail hunt. The deceased was riding in the rear of the truck. As the truck approached the Elias Jones home, on the Oroville-Oregon City road, James was evidently thrown from his seat and beneath the truck wheels. The

nephews did not know that their uncle had been thrown from the machine until they had driven for nearly 300 yards. Glancing back they saw him stretched upon the road. He was unconscious and bleeding profusely.

James was brought to Oroville by Lee Arthur and Dr. L. A. Jacoby.

The deceased is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Herman Tegrunde, of Pleasant Valley; Mrs. Mangler of Oroville, and Miss Maggie James of Oregon City; four brothers, Edward, Frank and George James of Oregon City.

W. P. LYNCH IS CALLED

The funeral of W. P. Lynch, prominent Butte Co. politician and business man who died at his Chico home Saturday night, will be held Tuesday at 10 a. m. in the Chico Catholic church. Interment will be in that city, it was announced today.

The death of Mr. Lynch did not come wholly unexpectedly, but yet was a shock to the entire county. Many friends gave expression of regret when they heard of the news of his death. He had been in failing health for some time and had consulted San Francisco physicians for an ailment to his heart. Last Friday he was on the streets of Chico conducting his business and Saturday night at 7 o'clock, surrounded by members of his family, he passed away.

Born in 1861

Since his boyhood days Mr. Lynch had been active in the affairs of Butte county. Born at the

old mining town of Oregon City, near Oroville in 1861, he maintained his residence within the county all his years. He was the sixth and last child of James and Mary Lynch, both natives of Ireland, who came to California in the gold rush in 1853.

The opportunities for education with Mr. Lynch were limited. He never went beyond the common school of one teacher and a few pupils maintained at Oregon City yet he became a cultured, educated man, especially well grounded in the political history of his country.

Elected Assessor

When but twenty-six years of age, Mr. Lynch was appointed deputy county assessor, and later was elected assessor for two terms serving with distinction and ability. Retiring from office he plunged into business, leasing, owning and dealing in lands, mining and timber properties and water rights. His abilities attracted men of capital and

he soon acquired a competency. When The Diamond Match Company came to Butte county in 1902, Mr. Lynch became associated with the company and rendered valuable service in that concern's early development work. When Stirling City was established, he organized the Stirling Mercantile Company, became its president, became president of the Stirling City Bank, and otherwise participated in the activities of the new town.

In 1914, desiring to give his family better educational advantages, he purchased a home in Chico and removed there, and in 1915, in partnership with J. H. Lucas and G. R. Snow, established the Chico Meat Company, which concern maintains markets in Chico and Oroville and has large stock and land interest.

Interested in Politics

Mr. Lynch always manifested a deep interest in political affairs. A Democrat all his life he was sent as a delegate to national and state conventions and numbered among his friends many distinguished leaders of both parties. He loved the county of his birth and was ever willing to give of his time and abilities for what he considered its good. Deeply loyal to his friends, he in turn was able to marshal

them whenever an issue in which he was interested was at stake.

The Survivors

Surviving Mr. Lynch leaves his widow, Mrs. Kathryn Lynch, to whom he was married in 1897; two daughters, Kathleen and Muriel; and two sisters, Misses Maggie and Mary Lynch, all of Chico. His only son, William P. Lynch, Jr., died last year, inflicting a blow from which he never recovered.

Mr. Lynch was a member of Chico Lodge of Elks and a member of the Catholic church.

Note: The Chico Meat Company was founded with the purchase of the old Pence Ranch from Christian Mortensen's widow. Mortensen was the ranch's second owner.

PIONEER OF EARLY BUTTE PASSES AWAY

Mrs. Johanna Thunen, a pioneer of early Butte county days passed away Sunday at the age of 92 years. She died at the home of her son, Edward Thunen in Oakland.

A native of Germany, Mrs. Thunen spent most of her life in California. She came west across the Isthmus of Panama 64 years ago when this state was still a land to be wrested from the Indian and wilderness.

Settling in Oroville, she with her family, later removed to Flea Valley a region then infested with wild bands of Indians. Mrs. Thunen at one time in 1865 witnessed the results of an Indian massacre and at her home was organized the band of frontiersmen who broke up the tribe responsible for the massacre.

Later she moved again to Oroville and for years, up to a short time ago resided in this city. She spent her last days at her son's home in Oakland.

The deceased had a wide acquaintance and friendship among the older settlers of Butte county and also among those who later enjoyed the fruits sown by the pioneers. Her passing will be mourned by many.

Mrs. Thunen is survived by the following children: Fred W. Thunen and Charles G. Thunen of Oroville, William Thunen of Weed, John A. Thunen of Nome, Alaska; Edward G. Thunen of Oakland and Frank Thunen of Berkeley.
