Reno Divorcees Held For Perjury Are Given Hearing

RENO (Nev.), Aug. 14.—Mrs. Irene H. Uren and Mrs. Julia A. Anderson, until recently residents of Eureka, Calif., today were to face a justice's court for a preliminary hearing on charges of perjury in connection with the attempt by Mrs. Uren to obtain a decree of divorce from William L. Uren.

The decree in the Uren case was granted yesterday, but to the husband. Mrs. Anderson was given her decree against Andrew H. Anderson of Eureka, Calif.

The women's difficulties arose last Saturday during the taking of testimony in Mrs. Uren's suit. Mrs. Uren testified she was a resident of Nevada, when, in fact, she had been in the state but four days and

actually is a resident of Eureka, Calif.

Mrs. Anderson's difficulties developed when she testified she had known Mrs. Uren for several years in Eureka, without enlightening the court she was referring to Eureka, Calif., and not to Eureka, Nev. The testimony was before Judge Edgar Eather of Eureka, Nev., who was presiding temporarily in the Reno court.

The Uren decree was given to the husband when it was shown he had been a resident of Nevada for several years. The Anderson decree was given to Mrs. Anderson, as originally prayed for, when the court was assured she had resided in Nevada for the required six weeks.
