\*\*\*RECIPE OF THE WEEK\*\*\*

PUMPKIN COOKIES

- 1 1/2 cups brown sugar
- 1 cup shortening
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup pumpkin
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 tsp. nutmeg
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 2 3/4 cups flour
- 1/4 tsp. baking powder
- 1 cup raisins
- 1 cup broken nutmeats

Cream shortening and sugar, add beaten eggs. Stir seasonings into pumpkin and add to creamed mixture. Sift flour with baking powder and salt, add to first mixture, then add raisins and nutmeats and beat well. Drop from spoon onto a greased cookie sheet and bake 15 minutes in 400° oven.

\*\*\*LETTER TO THE EDITOR\*\*\*

Dear Editor,

In the letter columns of the Enterprise-Record, a local newspaper, a writer bitterly protests a 350% increase in the tax on her home and well she might. I suspect there are a goodly number of us who struggled and sacrificed to accumulate a home and other support for a last few years of peaceful living outside the dog eat dog ratrace that is the "American Way", only to find that safeguard sucked into the maw of the Corporate State through insufferable taxation or outright seizure.

It seems to me that to protect ourselves, and that ever increasing number of unemployed, people on State welfare and other millions on fixed incomes, we must have enacted into law some or all of the following conditions:

Whenever a person leaves the business world (wage earning and profit taking) for any reason, disability, mental or physical, retirement age, inability to get work returning a living wage or any other reason, he shall be levied no tax,

Municipal, State or Federal, so long as his income (for a single person) does not exceed \$5000.00 per year or (a married person) \$7,500.00 per year and his net worth in property (home, money invested or in a bank, etc) does not exceed (for a single person) \$35,000.00 or (for a married person) \$50,000.00. Each tax payer may, in all cases, have an additional \$1,000.00 per year income for each dependent.

Such a tax reform as the above is not a wild dream but a very possible goal. It would only be necessary to close a few corporate tax loop holes such as oil depletion, tax free bonds, capital gains, no more million dollar incomes, tax free. Today the workers, wage earners, pay 68% of all Federal taxes, only 32% is paid by those able to pay, but that is another story. Our so called economists and tax experts go after those least able to protect themselves (the poor people) they think.

If anyone knows of a law maker in Sacramento who would sponsor such a tax bill lets get him on the ball or get busy ourselves with an initiative for the '72 elections.
