### \*\*\*CHINESE SANITARIUM AT DEADWOOD\*\*\*

This article on our past history was passed on to us by Gayel Childress of Pasadena. We are indeed grateful to Mrs. Childress. Concow and Yankee Hill have interesting and colorful pasts, unfortunately too little of this past history is of record, and accurate information is not readily available.

In 1875, Gerhardt Tebbe, a miner, along with his family moved into the old Deadwood Home.

George, the oldest son had fallen and bruised his thigh, this condition "worsened" until he could not walk, as his knee flexed until his toe would not touch the ground.

While mining on Deadwood Creek a Chinese asked Tebbe for employment, he was very friendly and "took a liking" to the children, and asked if he could try Chinese healing on the boy, using powders, poultices and teas. Neighbors criticized the family for allowing the "heathen Chinese" to treat the boy, but white doctors had cost Mr. Tebbe quite a large sum of money with no results, so he allowed Ah Sang to continue.

George was cured and became a happy lad who could run, jump, fight and play. News spread and soon all those critical neighbors, "the chronic's and incurables", flocked to the house. Gerhardt Tebbe built Ah Sang a sanitarium - one building at a time with accommodations for 50-100 people, including those who camped there for treatment.

The procedure went thus: Patient ushered into a dimly lit room and seated at the end of a table near the corner, the doctor sat opposite him - no questions asked, then Ah Sang placed his hand on a flat cushion and placed three fingers over the artery and sat eight to ten minutes, closed his eyes as if in a trance, lifting fingers and putting them down, then did likewise with the other wrist, finally telling the patient where his aches and pains were located - thus establishing confidence.

Each patient had his own tea pot, with his name on it, and his own special brew. At 4:00 every afternoon, at the bell, it was tea time - no water was allowed to patients, only the tea.

Ah Sang knew nothing of anatomy or physiology. His treatment sometimes based on superstition. He used "pulse findings", believing that there was a pulse for all organs of the body.

Business got better, two stages from Oroville and one from Chico came daily.

In 1883 Ah Sang went to San Francisco to buy his daughter from China, he had never seen her. She arrived veiled from China, he married her and they returned to Deadwood.

Mother Tebbe died in 1885, the two younger boys died one year later after a bout with diphtheria. The remaining Tebbes sold the property to Ah Sang and moved away. He continued the hospital for several years, during that time a son was born to Mrs. Ah Sang. Several years later they moved to Chicago, where Ah Sang died some time later.

Gerhardt Tebbe was killed in a mine accident in Georgetown in 1898.



\*\*\*RECIPE OF THE WEEK\*\*\*

CORN MEAL BACON MUFFINS

1 cup sifted flour  
3 tsp. baking powder  
2 tbsp. sugar  
1/2 tsp. salt  
2/3 cup yellow corn meal  
1/3 cup shortening ( part bacon fat)  
1/4 to 6 slices bacon, crisp and crumbled  
1 egg, well beaten  
3/4 cup milk

Sift flour once, measure and add baking powder, sugar and salt, sift again. Add corn meal and mix well. Cut in shortening and add crumbled bacon. Combine egg and milk and add all at once to flour mixture. To mix, draw spoon from side of bowl to center, chop spoon through batter and stir only enough to dampen flour. Turn onto greased muffin tins, filling each about 2/3 full. Bake in hot oven (400°) 25 minutes. Makes 10 large muffins.
