RECIPE OF THE WEEK

SPICY RANCH WAGON STEAK

1½ lbs. round steak
flour
2 tbsp. shortening
1-½ oz. can mushrooms
½ cup chopped onions
2 tbsp. green pepper
1/3 cup chili sauce
¼ tsp. garlic seasoning
¼ tsp. all purpose seasoning
¼ tsp. celery salt
¼ tsp. onion seasoning
¼ tsp. Worcestershire sauce
¼ cup sliced stuffed or ripe olives
¼ cup water

Cut steak into serving pieces. Roll in flour and brown thoroughly on both sides in shortening. Put meat into a covered baking dish. In the skillet used to brown meat, combine remaining ingredients. Heat to boiling, pour over meat, cover. Bake at 350° for about 1½ hours, or until meat is tender. Makes 6 servings.

The Wilderness by Henry David Thoreau.

We need the tonic of wilderness to wade sometimes in marshes where the bittern and meadow-hen lurk, and hear the booming of the snipe; to smell the whispering sedge where only some wilder and more solitary fowl builds her nest, and the mink crawls with its belly close to the ground.

At the same time that we are earnest to explore and learn all things, we require that all things be mysterious and unexplorable, that

land & sea by infinitely wild, uncharted and unfathomed by us because unfathomable.

We can never have enough of nature. We must be refreshed by the sight of inexhaustible vigor, vast and titanic features, the seacoast with its wrecks, the wilderness with its living and its decaying trees, the thundercloud, and the rain which fasts three weeks and produces freshets. We need to witness our own limits transgressed, and some life pasturing freely where we never wander.
