Climatic conditions - Concow - Yankee Hill area.

At elevations from 1900 to 2500 feet in Butte County we share a climate identical to the Rogue River Valley area of Southern Oregon, and a climate picture that is defined by a narrow line running generally from Redding to Bakersfield in the hill area below the Sierras.

The average growing season is 182 days, and midsummer averages of 86° to 90° temperature with winter lows averaging 30° to 35° allow a variety of fruit trees.

Deciduous plants and flowering shrubs such as peonies and lilacs are showy and thrive here. The American varieties of grapes produce in abundance, and though the growing season is shorter than the central valley the high light intensities compensate and vegetable crops will mature and bear well.

Word has been "effectively" passed around that we have a new reserve deputy in our midst, having personally checked this with the Sheriff's Department to ascertain its validity, I find that it is true. This is an alarming situation to many people in our small community.

My personal encounter with this person left me with the opinion of total irrational behavior.

I was hired by the late Robert E. Moore, to do some work at the rented residence of same individual, upon arriving with another neighbor, we were confronted with a shot gun being pointed at us. I was told that under no conditions was I permitted on the premises. It was the first time I had ever seen this person, as I had only arrived from Los Angeles a few months prior. The man with me argued, and was told that my family had been causing this woman problems for the past two years. Until that moment I had never seen the woman in my life, and my family did then and always have resided in the Los Angeles area.

This person is not, in my opinion, the type of individual who should be employed by any law enforcement agency, even on a limited reserve basis. It would seem to me that anyone with such a confused mind, full of hate and violence would not be the

one I would issue a gun and badge to.

I would urge any citizens who have had similar circumstances happen, to request a more complete investigation by the Sheriffs Department.

### \*\*\*EDITORIAL\*\*\*

In light of the trend of letters and phone calls during this past week

regarding the Sheriffs Department, we would like to comment on some line of thought.

Perhaps people in a small, rural community feel they are continually neglected, overlooked and wronged by county officials. Perhaps in many cases they are, being relatively small in size with no noticeable stature, it is fair to assume the larger incorporated areas demand and require more attention. However, the Sheriff, Under Sheriff, and all the deputies employed by the County, could not iron out the personal vendettas, prejudices and misunderstandings that breed within the community residents themselves.

As long as there are a certain hand full of people who believe that white is the only acceptable skin color, that those who are in a low income bracket are 3rd class citizens or below, that those who are not readily conforming to one cut plan for acceptance are to be feared and scorned, then there will be unrest and disagreements.

Some of the bloodiest battles in history have begun as "neighborhood disputes", the old saying "one rotten apple can spoil the whole barrel," is not particularly applicable, but a few bad apples can make life quite unpleasant, especially in a small community.

It would seem that if all persons were working toward one common goal, the betterment of the community, and their own goals for personal fulfillment, harmony would prevail. Not so! Back to the dim beginnings of time, men have been squabbling and fighting for bigger and better devices, more riches, more power, more authority, etc.

Naturally, we expect our county to employ the best people to do the most effective job, so it is with the largest county in the nation to the smallest. However, if more people spoke up, if they could "activate" themselves to be involved in the "beginnings" of county government rather than in the "aftermath", perhaps we could avoid such dilemmas.

The amazing thing to this editor is that very few have expressed any approval for Deputy Hopkins while he has been on duty in our area. Many residents are not aware of his presence, and would not know him if they met him at their door step. He could very well one day save one of

their lives! He has extended many a helping hand not required in the line of duty. How many have extended any hospitality to him?

One who is entrusted with authority, no matter how limited, should be one of Bob Hopkins calibre, with the interests of the people he serves foremost in his mind. Needless to say if he were the kind of man who made rash, uncertain decisions based on personal feelings, and overstepped his authority he would certainly not belong in law enforcement.

How does one judge a persons innermost motives? Perhaps by observing his actions, by his behavior over a period of time. Perhaps in some cases, not until it is too late.

Maybe if we could learn to lend more support to our law enforcement officers, they could better serve all of us.
