\*\*\*RECIPE OF THE WEEK\*\*\*

from Princess Pamelas Soul Food Cookbook.

"Turnip greens; good for fever and to calm down an angry man. Just three things I find offensive - mean men, back-bitin women, and sloppy cookin!

Now, no two people can cook up the same recipe in exactly the same way. There's a secret ingredient, and its in the cook, not the recipe. That is - lovin' kindness!"

Mixed greens (use any you have on hand such as)

1 bunch - collards, turnip greens or beet tops, mustard greens (wild or garden variety, kale, chard or spinach)

1 lb. bacon, salt pork or ham

1 clove garlic

3 red pepper pods (fresh or dried)

2 tbsp. vinegar

Salt & pepper

Green onions (or onion tops) for garnish

Wash greens cutting off tough stems. Pour boiling water over them and drain. Place all ingredients in a large pot with water to cover, boil slowly 1 1/2 hours removing lid the last 15 minutes to reduce liquid. Drain, saving liquid and arrange greens and meat on a platter. Sprinkle with chopped green onions. Serve corn bread alongside, with cups of "pot likker" for dunking.

\*\*\*EDITORIAL\*\*\*

We feel a certain amount of clarification is needed regarding the "Letters to the Editor" section. We

have received several calls during the week regarding the letter signed "Afraid for my job."

All letters to the editor are welcomed as long as they are not slanderous or malicious toward any private citizen or group of same. Names need not appear in the paper, but all letters must be signed, simply stipulate you want your name withheld, i.e. "weekly reader," "concerned citizen," etc.

We do not necessarily agree with nor disagree with letters, articles and other material printed. Letters should be limited to 500 words. Spelling, wording or phrasing will not be altered in any way unless specifically requested in letters.

Perhaps you are concerned about what constitutes slander. According to the State of California Jurisprudence, or an lawyer's terms applicable to most of us:

"Only four sorts of defamatory remarks constitute slander and libel, and provide grounds for a suit: 1. falsely accusing a person of having a loathesome illness, such as V.D.; 2. falsely accusing a person of a serious crime, such as murder or fraud; 3. falsely accusing a woman of being unchaste; 4. falsely damaging a persons professional reputation or job standing.

Public figures from park superintendent to President of the United States are usually fair game, simply because they are public figures. And although you can say pretty much what you want about them, they are extended the same privilege regarding private citizens.

The first amendment gives newspapers and other periodicals the right to publish without interference, this applies to private citizens as well. Whatever the law permits you to say outloud you can also say in writing - and you can print it and distribute it without asking anyone's permission. You can give your material away or you can sell it.

Back to the subject of slander and libel, a false accusation does not include expressing a personal opinion, i.e. "I feel," "in my opinion," "it seems to me," "I think." Rather a statement of fact such as, "he does," "he is," "They are."

Also expressing your emotions, love, like, dislike, or fear is not libel or slander. You are free to love, like, dislike or fear anyone you like.

\*\*\*BACKYARD ADVENTURE NO.9\*\*\*

"It was a nice little rain, but it didn't do much for the garden except to settle the dust." I wonder. I have determined, completely on my own, (because I have never found mention of it in my reading) that even such a small rain makes a difference in plant growth. Aside from the fact that the rain washes away pollen and dust particles the leaves get a stimulating facial. If massage is bracing to the facial muscles and promotes circulation then is it not possible that the patter of rain drops could conceivable stimulate growth in a plant?

Lightning releases nitrogen into the air, and I do believe the falling rain washes it into the soil. I try to do any transplanting or thinning just after a rain because the young plants don't go into shock. I have always felt guilty discarding the seedlings when I'm thinning out the rows. I have tried to transplant them without much success. One day I nibbled on one, as I picked away, and found it especially flavorful. Now I use them as sprouts in salads assured that they add as much nutritionally as they do in flavor.

Have you ever eaten a bean blossom, a seed pod from a radish or chinese cabbage, the cabbage stalk, the root from chard? Don't

cook anything you can eat raw; turnips, cauliflower, Jerusalem artichoke, young greens like spinach, chard, cress and endive lend interest and crunch to a salad. Try it in the garden first - then go into the woods. My first spring salads are Miner's lettuce, chick weed, sorrel and plantain tossed with manzanita and redbud blossoms. Pollen is very expensive in health food stores, and I have never seen flower nectar except when it has been distilled through a bee! Flower "pickles" can be put up in the spring for winter use. Don't just go into your garden, GET into it - touch the leaves, inhale the mingled scents, munch a pea blossom, an onion blossom. Make it an adventure.
