OLD HEN AND POT DUMPLINGS

1 old fat hen
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. pepper
1/2 cups flour
1 tsp. salt
1 large kettle with lid

Cut chicken as for frying. Cook in kettle with enough water to cover. Cook

until tender. Add salt. Mix flour, salt and enough chicken broth to form dough. Roll out dough and cut in squares or strips. Spoon drop dough in kettle, covering chicken, adding salt. Boil for 15 minutes.

BACKYARD ADVENTURE NO. 11

Oboy, have I ever been hearing it about the mushroom article! And all I've got to say is-----something's gonna getcha - one way or the other; a lightning bolt, a germ, a logging truck, the Super Bomb, booz, or old age. The old song goes:

"Rye whiskey, rye whiskey,
Rye whiskey, I cry,
And if a tree don't fall on me
I'll live till I die."

The day we are born we begin to die, so just plant me shallow, plant an acorn in my navel, and I'll grow you an Oak tree!

Meanwhile, back at the garden; I'm transplanting some chard and young broccoli plants and here's another 'homegrown' idea that work's! If possible, wait for an overcast day; morning or evening is best. Soak the earth around the transplants and the spot to which they are to be moved. Dig out the planting holes with a narrow transplanting trowel, so the sides will be practically vertical. Then lift the plants with the trowel and a kitchen fork probing around the root area to loosen it. Place the plant in the hole deeply enough so that the soil level will be just below the first two leaves. Firm the soil around it with the fork, leaving a basin, and water again.

Now pick two large squash or pumpkin leaves and make a tent over the transplants by poking the stems of the leaves into the wet ground. Moisture evaporates from them cooling the young plant as well as shading it and protecting it from the wind. When the leaves are dry, crumble them as mulch around the young plant.

If you are having trouble with cut worms or birds gobbling up the tender young plants cut milk cartons in half (or tin cans), discarding the tops and bottoms, and push them into the damp earth for further protection around each plant. Quail are notorious for holding community meetings in your new rows of transplants scratching up what they don't gobble up!

As an afterthought on the mushrooms: Who really knows the truth? Great curative powers may be waiting For "Science" to give us "The Proof." And, meanwhile I'll take my chances. Don't scoff at me and frown Could be "a little bit of" - muscarin Will make the suicides "go down."

TENANTS BEWARE

Some quotes from The Time-Life Family Legal Guide.

In Chapter "The Home" - Page 122 "Local laws generally require little more of a landlord than he rent his property free of health hazards and safety dangers." Page 126 - "As a renter of property, you are ordinarily entitled to many of the owner's basic property rights: the right to "quiet enjoyment" of the premises, to invite anyone you please - and within the limits of your neighbors' equal right to quiet enjoyment-to do anything you like within the confines of your home. Moreover, as a renter you have the right to live there, as one court put it, "unmolested in any way by the landlord."

"The Tactic of the Rent Strike" - Suppose, however, that the landlord fails to keep the property safe for human occupancy and you do not want to move. Some people faced with this problem have decided to stop paying rent-they staged "rent strikes." Only certain states, among them California, New York, and Pennsylvania have held rent strikes legal. And the laws in those states vary as to the manner of withholding rent. Some allow you simply to keep the rent money; while others permit you to use it to repair the defective conditions; while others require you to place the money in escrow account and give the landlord a specific amount of time, perhaps 6 months, to clear up the problem. It is also more prudent to

act in conjunction with other tenants. Bear in mind that the Courts as of today have permitted rent strikes only in cases where a landlords failure to clear up a defect endangers the health of a tenant - a leaky roof, for example, or a malfunctioning elevator in a skyscraper apartment house.

Chapter "Crime" - page 256 -
"The negligent act. A landlord who fails to maintain proper safeguards against fire and whose tenants die when his house goes up in flames can also be found guilty of criminal homicide. A court will not accept his defense that he should not be held responsible because he was unaware of the local ordinances about fire hazards; the law holds that a landlord should know about such regulations and that he desregards them at his own peril."

How many of you renters were unaware of your rights as tenants. Of course you have obligations too, you cannot tear a house up, break the windows, punch holes in the walls, etc. If you do, you are not being a decent tenant unless you fix these things. However, many people have been herded like sheep into believing they have no rights. There is one however, be prepared if you say anything about dangerous conditions, to be evicted on the spot. Many landlords are totally unwilling to accept their responsibilities as a homeowner. They are of course, willing to accept your rent money.

Before you decide to rent a house you should always check on the landlords policy regarding these matters. Some people have to find out the hard way that the landlord has no intention of keeping the house you pay your monthly rent on safe to live in.

EDITORIAL

Many of our young people are registering
to vote in this election, and the reason
for the enthusiasm on the part of a great
majority of them, is the marijuana initiative.

In light of the report by the American
Medical Association of a few months back,
stating they believed, as far as they could
determine, that use of marijuana was not
physically hazardous, although in some it
could produce a mental dependency, but
no physical addiction.

Of course there are pro's and con's to
marijuana the same as there are to alcohol
and tobacco. Some people are allergic to
the plant, some overindulge to a frightening
degree, some mix it with alcohol or other
more harmful drugs. Those who use it to
affect a spiritual or religious communion
or "trip" may be in for a disappointment.
American Indians have used Peyote for this
purpose for centuries, but scientists be-
lieve the over-all desired result they
achieve is a combination of superstition

handed down through the years, a self-hypnotic or other self induced trance, and the effect of the drug itself.

We know that alcohol deteriorates brain cells, is detrimental to the heart, liver, blood stream, kidneys, etc. Cigarettes are linked with everything from lung cancer to migrain headaches, to the point of carrying a warning from the Surgeon General's Office on each pack. Nicotine is addictive, causing withdrawl symptoms more severe in certain individuals than in others tryint to "kick the habit."

Each year countless deaths are caused by the drunk driver on our highways. Alcoholism is on the upswing, in determined cases, not allowing for those who do not seek help nor admit to having the disease.

An individual using marijuana is happy, not belligerent, his senses are heightened, he does not have an urge to drink while smoking, yet if he is "busted" he is a felon!

We are not advocating the use of the Cannabis plant, nor are we condemning it.

However, it would seem logical to us, to find out about the thing which so many members of our society constantly put down. Check its merits and its disadvantages as you would on the background of a presidential candidate. Check records, ask people who have used it, people who use it regularly, if you are so inclined what better way to formulate an honest opinion than to try it. Then you will be in a position to judge it fairly. The ravages of alcohol are obvious, the death tolls are a cold, hard fact, the living hell endured by the family of the alcoholic living proof. If you have any doubts at all about nicotine, ask your doctor, watch the smoker who has smoked for 20 or 30 years, trying to "kick the habit" to which he is addicted. Or better yet, see a film showing the way a smoker's lungs really look, we suggest this only for those with a strong stomach. Write to the leading tobacco companies and find out just how much land they have set aside

and how many "experimental" plants and seeds they have, just in case the marijuana initiative passes.

Legget & Myers, Philip Morris, etc., may have trouble in controlling and exploiting the marijuana market they way they have the tobacco industry since marijuana is much, much easier to grow, harvest and process than tobacco. But they intend to try their best!
