The letter was written by Charles Hussey to a friend, John Jacob Grubb in Fidelity Mo., now a ghost town.

The document was said to be in remarkable condition, although a few words could not be deciphered. The Chico Enterprise-Record asks that anyone who might be related to the letter writer or have any information about the early day pioneer, contact the Enterprise-Record city desk at 342-2421.

I scratch out this seated on the exposed

root on the south side of a large aspen tree. The cold biting wind of the high desert, blowing from the north now in strong gusty blasts, shakes the leaves so they sound like children's clapping.

We are about 9000 feet elevation, above the Madeli Plains, near the Nevada border. The aspen groves are plentiful here in the high desert, and the deer run from the open sagebrush to these sheltering copses for protection during the yearly onslaught of "The Deer Hunters."

Deer hunters are a strange breed arriving these days with full regalia in red hats with guns bristling from jeeps and pickups; campers loaded to overflowing, trail bikes mounted fore or aft, deer carriers protruding, smoking up the dirt road hell bent for the kill! So much for this common species; back to the trees!

The aspen belongs to the poplar family. The petiole (or leaf stem) is flattened, so that the slightest breeze shaking the leaves causes them to flash in the wind like golden silver dollars. This tremulous white barked tree reminds me of the Eastern birch. How I would love to bring one home to plant near the garden at Concow, but trees thrive only in spots of their own choosing at elevations with soil and water conditions accordant to their needs.

Aldo Leopold wrote, in A Sand County Almanac, that he grubbed out the birch in favor of the pine because it was abundant in his area. But if his farm had been farther to the north he would have done the opposite! Perhaps we are biased in favor of the underdog - a good thought to ponder, alone, in a grove of Quaking Aspen.
