### AREA HEALTH CLINIC MAY BECOME A REALITY

Mrs. Bette Hayes, Concow resident, reports that the Health Clinic Survey has covered approximately 10% of the area. About 89 homes have been surveyed. It has been determined from the survey that this is not a deprived area. Rural clinics funded by state or federal funds are mainly for deprived areas.

However, Mrs. Hayes has located a suitable building to house the clinic, it is located on Highway 70. Dr. Bill Taylor and Dr. Karubian, both of Paradise, have said they would come to the clinic one day a week - Tuesdays, both doctors have seen the building. Also a local X-Ray technician states that he will donate his time and the use of his small X-ray machine once the clinic has been established. The clinic will be capable of dispensing some medication, conducting EKG's, giving emergency treatment, drawing blood, giving physical examinations, etc.

The clinic would be self-supporting and would accept Medi-Cal patients. The clinic would also be open for hypertensive screening during the week, volunteer workers have offered assistance to keep the clinic open during the week. Immunizations could be given through the clinic also.

# COMMUNITY MEETING HAS GOOD TURNOUT

The meeting of July 6, had a good turnout, approximately 60 people attended.

Jim Laird, Chief of the Volunteer Fire Fighters of the Golden Feather Volunteer Fire Company, spoke on activities of the fire fighters, and stressed the need for more people to take the training courses to assure that vacancies, when they arise, may be filled without delay. Training sessions are held on the

second and fourth Thursdays of the month. The next two will be held at the Jarbo Gap Fire Station, beginning at 7 P.M. If you are interested in taking this training course, plan to attend the next training session and fill out an application. Nancy Lehmer, Second Captain for the Volunteers, pointed out that this is not limited to men only.

Mr. Laird also pointed out that the volunteer fire company engine, #37, has a recessitator and the Jarbo Gap unit does not.

The work day held on July 1 was very successful, with Board members, volunteer fire fighters and citizens of the community turning out to lend their assistance. Watch for signs on the Bulletin Board at the site and at Park Hill, and notices in the GFE for the next work day.

The Golden Feather Community Association, (consisting of all those present at the meeting), voted to form a committee of volunteers to write bi-laws as guidelines for a formalized community association complete with officers to be elected. Those volunteering to serve on the committee are: Clare Rodriguez, Judy Saville, Skip Clark, Howard Clark, Jim Galli, Bob Norton and Frank Cuny. Their first meeting was held on Wednesday afternoon and they will report back at the next community meeting.

Thoughts on future topics for community meetings were: Zoning - a long discussion followed mention of this with the majority of those in attendance stating they were willing to fight to keep A-2. A-2 zoning has been declared illegal by the State of California, and counties have been mandated by the State to phase out and replace A-2 zoning in all rural areas. Other areas of concern were the steep hill and problems caused by mud slides on Concow Road, and the possible future draining of Lake Concow.

The defoliation project by the U.S. Forest Service was discussed. This project is to control broadleaf growth (oak, manzanita, dogwood, etc) to insure better growth rates for conifers.

Bill Lampkin, employee of USFS, told the group that due to pressure from citizens, mainly the group in Berry Creek, the USFS made the decision not to do aerial spraying in the Oroville area this year only.

He also related that a directive from the Under Secretary of Agriculture had been issued to the USFS directing that, "no more women of child bearing age shall handle, mix or spray these herbicides".

The Golden Feather Community Association went on record in total agreement and support of the following statement. This statement heads up a petition by those in opposition to the herbicidal spraying. It was further voted to send this notification of our support to county, state and federal levels. The statement reads:

"According to an Environmental Protection Agency Official, Dioxin is likely the most toxic small molecule known to man. It has been stated in the U.S. Department of Agriculture booklet, Toxicology of Phenoxy Herbicides and Hazard Assessment of Their Use in Reforestration, by Frank N. Dost, PhD., that with the use of TODD (Dioxin) there is indeed a possibility that acceptable dos s may assume cumulative effects; which means it can build up in the body tissues. This booklet also points out that Dioxin is teratogenic and so can cause birth abnormalities. Due to the controversial nature of the information available on the effect of human life of the phenoxy herbicides, 2,4,5-T, Silvex, and 2,4-D, we, the undersigned, do hereby solidly, openly and absolutely oppose the use of all phenoxy herbicides in our National Forests or on private land".

The next community meeting was set for August 3rd, at Concow School at 8 P.M.

### CONCOW POOL WILL REMAIN OPEN - FOR NOW

Terry Ashe was unable to attend the community meeting. Frank Cuny, Recreation Advisory Committee Chairman, reported. Status of the recreation districts is still unknown as far as the impact of Proposition 13 is concerned. They are still not sure what cutbacks will be made or in what areas. Cutbacks, by the best estimates will be from 50 to 80%. There will probably not be an after school recreation program at Concow this year.

Concow Pool will remain open at least until the end of July.

The recreation advisory committee was originally formed to protest the high rate of taxes going out of our district with little or no return. Communication between this area and the recreation districts have greatly improved, and we have gained some services and some cooperation from Feather River Recreation District in Oroville, where none existed before. At this time neither Feather River nor Paradise Recreation District can make future development commitments because of the uncertainties of Proposition 13. Facilities, are however, always built where the greatest population is served. Our area, population wise is small, our tax base is high because of P.G.&E., the railroad, and large timber holdings in the area.

The homeowners assistance provides partial reimitursement of 1977-78 property taxes to seniors who were 62 or older on December 31, 1977, own and occupy their home, and had \$12,000 or less in total household income for 1977. Rent assistance is available to seniors over 62, who paid \$50 or more a month in rent last year, and who had \$5,000 or less in total household income during 1977.

# Drying Mushrooms

Where an abundance of mushrooms are found they may be kept for future use by drying them in the sun, removing stems from the very large ones. When they seem to be thoroughly dry, they can be placed in a very slow oven for an hour to complete the process and then packed into clean jars and sealed. These are excellent for winter soups and gravies. To be made ready for use, simply soak in warm water to soveral hours.

Pickled Mushrooms. Wash mushrooms and boil in salted water, skimming as they boil, then put into cold salted water and allow to stand for 24 hours. Pour off water and allow to stand for a week in white wine vinegar. Remove mushrooms from the vinegar and boil, with pepper, cloves, mace and other desired spices. When liquid is cold, add mushrooms and place in sealed jars.
