One of the many colorful species of milkweed, Butterfly Weed, is a perennial plant whose orange blossoms color dry, open grasslands from New England to Arizona throughout the summer months. The like-colored concentric clustered blossoms of Orange Hawkweed also bloom from June to September in the fields and along roadsides of Northeastern United States.

The Monardh Butterfly, well-known in North America for its fall migratory habits when resting flocks may cover entire trees, is reputed to have a disagreeable taste and odor which seems to make birds avoid eating them. The Great Spangled Fritillary is of the "Brush Footed Butterfly" family, named for their tiny forelegs which are hairy and useless for walking.

Buttermilk Cake

2 cups sugar
1 cup shortening (cream well)
Add 4 eggs one at a time
Add alternately:
3 cups sifted flour
½ tsp. soda
½ tsp salt with
1 cup buttermilk
For flavoring add 1 tsp vanilla
Or juice of 2 oranges and ½ lemon
Or ½ cup cocoa and ½ tsp. vanilla

Bake in greased, floured tube pan at 350 about 1 hour until top springs back when touched.

Broiled Icing

1 cup brown sugar 4 TBSP canned milk 1 stick margerine 1 chopped pecans 1 cup coconut

Mix and spread on loaf cake. Broil for several minutes until brown sugar is melted.

USING WAYSIDE PLANTS

BARBERRIES: Although fairly well eliminated throughout the West where wheat growing is important, isolated plants of the barberry are to be found along almost any country road in the Northeast. To the wheat grower the barberry is an enemy because it is a host plant of a fungoid wheat disease, but for those not engaged in farming, the barberry is a remarkably useful plant.

The barberry shrub can easily be identified by its drooping branches and egg-shaped red fruit, and when used as a specimen lawn plant it can be very beautiful.

There are records from the time of the Egyptians telling of the various uses of the barberry, especially of its medicinal use for liver complaints. The yellow stem of the plant produces a dye which is permanent, without the addition of mordanting materials. The slightly acid fruits which are so abundant in the fall have a prime culinary use in the making of spiced preserves. The juice in jelly making can be extracted without adding water. By cooking it very slightly, and then straining it, it makes a tart and distinctive jelly.

The fruits of the barberry are a great attraction to birds, especially the Cedar Waxwings which descend on the bushes in great numbers during their fall migration. It is a very valuable plant to have in any bird sanctuary.

GLIMPSES INTO THE PAST

Notes about the original area residents: The Californis grizzly bear weighed well over a ton. The California grizzly has long been extinct. The bear represented by the famous "Bear Dance", however, is the California black bear, a very special bear to the Indian people. They still celebrate the Bear Dance each year in Janesville, Ca. the first weekend of June. This is (traditionally) to celebrate the coming of a new year.

The Indians of our area, (Concow-Yankee Hill) burned the land each year, and limited the growth of the oak trees, so there were special areas where the oaks grew undisturbed with no burning, these were known as parklands to the Indians. The oaks really got a strong foothold in all areas after the coming of the white man.

John Bidwell organized several hunting parties each year to go on grizzly hunting expeditions. Generally these hunts would yield a kill of btween 2 to 6 bears. John Bidwell's Indians at his Chico rancheria were bitter enemies to the Indians of this area. Many of the people from here were taken to Bidwell's on the long march to Round Valley, and a great many of them were poisoned while there by the Bidwell Indians.

Most California tribes were by nature not warlike, but they all believed that they had the greatest possible weapon, spiritual power. The material weapons they possessed for warfare were quite crude until the white man introduced the rifle to them!
