FIRE CAUSES HEAVY SMOKE DAMAGE TO ROCK HOUSE

Rock House owner, Bob Ausmus, states that clean up operations are continuing and will probably not be completed until Monday. He will announce an opening date in next week's issue of GFE.

The fire was apparently started by a cigarette left in an ashtray. The only thing completely destroyed by fire was a booth, the rest of the damage was from smoke. Approximately \$5,000.00 worth of damage to be exact.

A passing Highway Patrolman spotted the fire and called it in. The units from Jarbo Gap and the Golden Feather Volunteers responded, with the units from Jarbe arriving within 10 minutes.

FIRE STATION NEWS

Hopefully, next Saturday, September 30, the last day of the month, weather will permit assembly of the dome structure and all the community will see the results of much hard work by our dedicated volunteer workers.

Much work remains to be done however, and a standing invitation is extended to all who can help in this worthy project to participate whenever possible.

Shagbark Hickory

One of the first historical facts that comes to mind in a growing child, is the name of Jackson, also known as "Old Hickory". Also, in reading about the early life of Lincoln, it tells of how he earned money felling hickory trees and splitting the rails to make fences.

Although the nuts are valued, the very toughness of it's wood makes it a very special tree, as there are many uses for such an enduring wood. Our early American fences were made of split hickory, as were many parts of wagons and the handles of tools. Also, in the early days before coal was commonly used, the hickory was the prime fuel of the early settlers, modern statistics show that a cord of hickory is almost equivalent to a ton of hard coal.

Lest, but by no means least, is the value of the green wood of the hickory for smoking hams end bacoms. It is sad to note that the hickory is gradually disappearing from our woods. The large ones chready having been cut and the new ones finding it harder to get established. No one who has ever been hunting in the fall and has come upon a harvest of hickory nuts can ever deny its place near the top of the list of valuable American trees.
