The teachers of the Golden Feather Union School District will be conducting a workshop for Proficiency Standards. Minimum days have been declared for Wednesday, November 1, 8 and 29; December 6 and 13. They will also observe minimum days for conferences at Concow School, which will be the week of November 13 - 17. Dismissal times at Spring Valley will be 1:50 and Concow 2:10 p.m.

BROWN VETO'S AB 3511

AB 3511 was to provide some 400 portable classrooms to those school districts in California which are seriously over-crowded. Rural schools are the most seriously affected, and as people continue to move out of the cities and into the rural communities, the problem will continue.

AB 3511 would have set up guidelines so that only those schools in California which were overcrowded by heavy growth would qualify for portable classrooms. The state was to purchase the portable buildings and lease them to individual school districts at \$1.00 per year.

Governor Brown said that the leasing program was not the most appropriate method....The bill was authored by Leroy Greene, and it is expected that members of the Assembly will ask for an over-ride.

FIRE STATION NEWS

The weather last Saturday was just beautiful and the volunteers were able to accomplish all the work cut out for them. The wall sheathing is almost completed, the toilet partitions are in place, and the footings for the 1000 gallon emergency water tank have been poured.

The work next Saturday, weather permitting of course, will involve an entirely new talent and technical know-how. Fiberglass asphalt shingles have been purchased and delivered, along with the necessary underlay felt, staples and roofing nails. So now the call is for everyone in the community who has roofing experience and can help with this phase of the project. Just the thought of applying shingle squares, as they are called, to an hemispheric geodesic dome sounds pretty complicated.

Thus far, the building costs have been kept within the amounts budgeted despite sky-rocketing prices for all materials. Thanks for this savings to the Fire Company goes to the volunteers themselves who contribute not only their time and talent, but give generously of their resources too. This week special thanks are due to Bud Bell for supplying the large door post timbers (costly items), and to Jim Galli for the heavy reinforcement

bars in the water tank piers, and to Frank Moore who had to make two trips to town to haul in the roofing materials. There are others too, that provide what is needed and our thanks to them, though unpublished now, are never the less sincere.

Concow Grange has been generous in its sponsorship of the Golden Feather Volunteer Fire Co. and has relinquished use of the Grange Hall to the Fire Company for a dinner on December 9, 1978.

The Yankee Hill Ladies Club, likewise, are very generous in their support of the Fire Company. They have made it the object of their current community assistance program, and are helping with arrangements for the December dinner.

It is expected that other organizations, businesses and individuals too, will want to participate in making a success of this important fund-raising event. The Golden Feather Echoes will publish all information on who to call and what is happening as soon as it is available.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Green Tomato Mince Meat by Alyce Hendricks - her mother's recipe - it is over 100 years old

5 lbs chopped apples	$\frac{1}{4}$ cup water
5 lbs green tomatoes	2 tsp. cinnamon
3 cups raisons	3 tsp. allspice
5 cups brown sugar	1 tsp. cloves
1 cup cider vinegar	2 tsp. salt

Mix and cook 3 hours and seal hot. If you have no scales, 3 pints is about 5 pounds. I also add about $\frac{1}{2}$ cup suet.
