SPECIAL SCHOOL BOARD MEETING ON MONDAY OCTOBER 30

The Golden Feather Governing Board of Trustees met to review the letters of those stating an interest in serving in the vacant seat on the school board. This vacancy was created by the resignation of Tobe Moak on October 14, 1978.

The Board reviewed the letters and briefly interviewed each of the applicants in open session. They voted to provisionally appoint Jeyce Clark to the Board. This appointment will not be confirmed for 30 days. During this time anyone in the district may petition for a special election to fill the seat. Notices were posted at Concow School, Park Hill Grocery and Spring Valley School.

FIRE STATION PROGRESS REPORT

Work progress at the fire station was slowed down considerably last Saturday because there were too few helpers to assist the mem laying the shingles on the roof. The shape of the dome building requires some of the shingles be trimmed at an angle. So, without helpers, much time was lost climbing up and down the scaffolding ladders. The need for skilled and unskilled help alike on this project was clearly demonstrated. Try to make it to the fire station next Saturday, weather permitting so that the rest of the shingles can be placed. Then, with the installation of the 10 foot high by 16 foot wide, roll-up door, the fire station will be secure from inclement weather.


OROVILLE HIGH VARSITY

RODGERS FLAT FIRE

The fire in the canyon started just before noon on Monday, near the derailed train. The cuase of the fire was listed by the Forestry as an escaped campfire.

High winds, steep canyons and lack of roads proved to be a problem in containing the blaze.

Air tankers were used periodically whenever the north winds subsided. Heavy smoke also hampered efforts of the air tankers.

The fire had to be fought by hand crews. The Forestry Department accepted only qualified fire fighters to fight the blaze because of the dangerous terrain.

On Wednesday the Forestry estimated that containment of the fire on the west side of the canyon would come sometime on Thursday morning. The east side was still burning out of control.

There were no structures in the area, and it was thought for a time that the P.G.&E. tower lines were in danger, this proved to be untrue.

As of Wednesday noon the Forestry had estimated some 1800 acres had been involved in the fire, and there were approximately 800 men fighting the blaze.

"COD GIVES INSTRUCTION".

The Living Bible does a beautiful job in translating two portions of Pauls letters to Timothy that I offer them to you without comment! They are II Tim. 4;1-4, and I Tim. 4; 1-10.

"And so I solemnly urge you before God and before Christ Jesus... who will some day judge the living and the dead when He appears to set up His Kingdom, to preach the WORD OF GOD urgently at all times, whenever you get the chance, in season and out, when it is convenient and when it is not. Correct and rebuke your people when they need it, encourage them to do right, and all the time be FEEDING them patiently with GOD'S WORD. For there is going to come a time when people won't listen to the truth, but will go around looking for teachers who will tell them just what they want to hear. They won't listen to what the Bible says but will blithely follow their own misguided ideas."

"But the Holy Spirit tells us clearly that in the last times some in the church will turn away from Christ and become eager followers of teachers with devil-inspired ideas. These teachers will tell lies with straight faces and do it so often that their consciences won't even bother them. They will say it is wrong to be married and wrong to set meat, even though God gave these things to well taught Christians to enjoy and be thankful for.
