COMMUNITY MEETING LAST WEEK HAD SPARSE TURN-OUT

The Community Meeting held last Thursday evening was attended by a group of some sixteen residents.

The purpose of the meeting was to go over the remaining portion of the By-Laws and to note any changes. This was done with a minimal amount of changes in the remaining portion. Ratification, will hopefully, be done at the December meeting.

Frank Cuny, Recreation Advisory Committee Chairperson, gave a run-down on the status of the committee. He stated that the position of the committee at this point was 'inactive'. They are not able to function due to the conflict between the Recreation Districts and the Golden Feather School District.

Mr. Cuny stated that the committee would not be able to function again until negotiations between the three bodies were undertaken.

Money has been allocated by both Paradise and Feather River for this year for some development in our area. However, it was a small allocation and could possibly be off-set by Prop. 13 effects.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Nobby Apple Cake by Lucille Lamkin

- (1) Cream: 3 tbsp. butter
1 cup sugar
1 egg beaten
- (2) Sift together and add to above:
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. cinnamon
 - $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. nutmeg
 - $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt
 - 1 tsp. soda
 - 1 cup flour

- (3) Stir in: 3 cups peeled - diced raw apples
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup walnuts
1 tsp. vanilla.

Bake in 8" x 8" x 2" greased pan at 350° for 40-45 minutes.
Serve hot or cold - if recipe is doubled bake for 1 hour.

FIRE STATION REPORT

To the folks travelling on Concow Road, the work progress on the fire station this week was already evident; nearly two-thirds of the roof shingles are on; the front wall panels are in place; and the big roll-up door has been installed. After last week's slow progress and with so many of the volunteers having to be out of town, the outlook for Work Day looked very gloomy. But the gloom was soon dispelled when many new volunteers appeared on the job, and soon the men paired off to the work calling for their particular skills and things then were rapidly being accomplished.

The men on the roof had a tough job. Ray Gaither, Mitch Mitchell, Bert Hollopeter and Carl Baldwin, among others, had to hang on to ladders, teeter on long scaffolds and even kneel out in thin air at the end of a rope on a "boatsun's" chair. The wall panel job too, called for some fancy ladder work and Bill Wobbe showed real agility along with his carpentry skill. The fellows taking on the job of installing the big door were beset with many problems and relative fragility. The door frames had to be modified and strengthened to accommodate the holding brackets - and most of the work had to be done from tall steep ladders. But we had men who knew what to do and went ahead and did it. We owe special thanks to Jim Laird, Jim Giles, Bob Seville and others too; and especially to Lief Steinberger for providing and operating the backhoe loader to lift the heavy door into place. It was a delicate operation involving heavy equipment but all these fellows knew what they were doing and they did it well.

Now a brief word about the Golden Feather Volunteer Fire Company ham dinner on December 9, 1978 at the Concow Grange Hall.

As reported before the ladies of the community are really behind this effort 100% and exciting things are happening. Already raffle tickets for the hand crafted items are available at 50¢ each or 3 for \$1.00, or in books of 12 for \$4.00.

Many who are unable to support the fire company otherwise, are offering to purchase one or more books of raffle tickets as their contribution to this worthy cause. Everyone can find a way to help.

Items from the Northern Enterprise, Chico - April 27, 1872.

*Chester Robinson, the irrepressible, has returned from Susanville with a valuable horse, stolen from Geo. E. Williams last March (another having been stolen from O.D. Morse by the same gang) and with one of the "stock drivers" "Kanaka" John, in his company. The Williams horse, with a saddle, had been sold for \$20, and the Morse horse had perished in the snow. Kanaka John was taken before Judge Hallet who committed him for trial.

The Town of Chico, by Judge Hallet, fined John McCabe \$5 for being drunk and disorderly, and Thomas White \$10 for the same indulgence.*

BROWN SUGAR TIPS

This was submitted a long, long time ago by Jay, and we apologize for being so "Untimely" with her material.

"Brown sugar has the tendency to harden unless precautions are taken. It is best stored in a mason jar or other well sealed glass or chinaware. The following are folk recipes to keep brown sugar from drying hard: Put $\frac{1}{2}$ sliced apple, orange or grapefruit on top of sugar with skin side on bottom; put a slice of bread or a leaf of lettuce in the container; a wet piece of muslin kept in the container will keep sugar from hardening and soften it also. As brown sugar is easily made, storing it is really not necessary. Recipe: Blend 1 cup of granulated sugar with 4 tablespoons of un sulphured molasses."
