Jim Schmidt, manager of Thermalito Irrigation District, reported on the monthly Board of Directors meeting.


There will soon be a mobile home at the caretaker's site at Concow Lake. This is formerly where the Washeleski mobile home was located. The newcomers are Harold and Dorothy Duncan, retired managers of the Camp-Otel R.V. park in Oroville. They will act as caretakers for the lake, and will move in within the next few months.

Mr. Schmidt also reports the Board discussed the inquiries from our area about possible annexation for irrigation and domestic water service to homes in the Concow area. At present no chlorination facilities are available to provide domestic water. And those who would desire annexation would have to be contiguous to the lake. There would be no taxation involved and revenue comes strictly from user fees.

Annexation is a possibility, and once annexation takes place TID would be eligible for federal grant funding allowing them to provide facilities for domestic water uses. Mr. Schmidt indicated that those interested should work through an organized group, either the Community Association or a group strictly involved with annexation.

He indicated that one of the members of the Board of Directors would be happy to come into the area and address the community on the possibilities of using Lake Concow as a water supply. They, in turn, would welcome a spokesman from the community group to come to any of the Board meetings on the issue.

They have had several inquiries up to this point, so if there are a number of residents interested in pursuing this, you are advised to talk to your neighbors and form an organized group to explore the possibilities and the obvious advantages of having more of a say in what happens to the water in Lake Concow.

Barbara Jean received many beautiful and useful gifts. ***


Julie Grieco spent Easter school vacation week with Grandma. Jay at Point Dawn on Big Bend Road.

We are sure the services they will provide will help the Golden Feather community and we wish them success in the new venture.




